The terms, provisions and limitations of the Amateur (Sound) Licence have been revised and I now have pleasure in enclosing your new licence. Would you please acknowledge receipt of this licence on the enclosed printed form. As you are aware from clause 14 of your previous licence that licence should now be returned to the Postmaster General. Would you please therefore return it together with the acknowledgement of your new licence. An addressed label is enclosed for your use.

You will see that the revised licence is entitled Amateur (Sound) Licence A. This is to distinguish it from the newly introduced amateur licence entitled Amateur(Sound) Licence B which authorises the use of telephony only on frequencies above 420 Mc/s only. The principal differences between the previous and revised licences are set out for convenience as an Appendix to this letter. As regards clause 3(2) of the licence you may also find it useful to have the enclosed Table giving guidance on the requirements of frequency measuring apparatus.

Clause 4(1) of the licence requires that the apparatus comprised in the station shall be so designed, constructed, maintained and used, that the use of the

/station

station does not cause any undue interference with any wireless telegraphy. In this connection your attention is drawn particularly to the guidance about siting of aerials given in note (c) to the licence.

In connection with clause 9(3) of the licence you will see that note (p) to the licence recommends the use of the phonetic alphabet set out in that note when the letters of the call sign are transmitted phonetically.

In view of the difficulties which are frequently experienced in effecting delivery of communications, particularly renewal accounts, to holders of amateur licences, your attention is drawn to note (a) to the licence. Furthermore, any proposal to change the main address referred to in clause 1(1)(a) of the licence must be notified to the Postmaster General and his consent obtained by amendment of the licence to the establishment and use of the station at the new main address.
