Dear

I am writing to you with further information on the use of the 50 MHz band for research purposes.

Because of problems with breakfast TV two of the 40 stations returned their licences to the Home Office. However below is the current list of 40 stations and more data.

GM3DOD, GM3WOJ, GM3OBC, GM4ELV/A, GM3WCS, GM3ZBE, GM4FZH, GM4FDT, GM4DIJ, GM4IHJ, G4JLH, GW4IIL/A, GW3LDH, GW4HEK, GW4HXO, GW4BCD, GJ3RAX, GJ3YHU, GJ4ICD, GI3RXV, GI4MJD, GI3ZSC, G5KW, G3OHH, G2AOK, G3LTF, G3USF, G3NOX, G4BFPY, G3PWK, G3VZJ, G4IJE, G4GLT, G6XM, G4CUT, G3COJ, G3ZIG, G3TCU, G4HUP and G4BAO.

The Home Office have confirmed with the BBC that Breakfast television ( On BBC1 ) is NOT transmitted on any VHF transmitter. Thus Breakfast TV will NOT prevent you from transmitting between 50-52 MHz.

The BBC suggest that each operator check the local press for details of VHF transmissions in the local area. However it may be better if you were able to set up a monitor receiver on your local VHF BBC1 transmitter. In any event transmissions may take place when 'your local' transmitter is not broadcasting.

For those that missed the previous letter from me a reminder that it is not permissible for you to make crossband contacts to Class B licencees as they are not authorised under thier licences to 'communicate' using bands not in their schedule of frequencies.

I will write again, should there be any further news.
