- 2. In Clause 2 of Licence B, the following words shall be substituted for sub-clause (b):
- "The Station shall be used only within those frequency bands which appear between the frequencies 144.00 MHz and 250,000 MHz in the first column of the Schedule subject to those limitations named in the second column of the Schedule and shall be used only with a power not exceeding that specified in the fourth column of the Schedule and shall use only those types of transmission named in the fifth column of the Schedule.'
- 3. From 1st February 1986 the Schedule to both Licence A and Licence B shall be varied to allow the following insertion to be made between those entries, in respect of the frequency band 28,000 MH to 29,700 MHz, as to the status of allocation to the Amateur Service and to the Amateur Satellite Service, the maximum power and the permitted types of transmission, and those said entries in respect of the frequency band 70.025 MHz to 70.500 MHz. This means that initially only Class A licencees will be able to transmit on 50-50.500 MHz.
